The Gardens of Japan - Graham Hardman

Graham's experience of Japanese gardens is his passion and pleasure in life. He explained the history, culture, society and art and maintenance of Japanese gardens, with large brush strokes to the finest detail. We saw beautiful photographic images of spectacular gardens and a fascinating talk that held us all entranced. It opened up a world of gardens rarely seen from his extensive knowledge and travels of the mysterious land of Japan. Graham then, brought us nearer home with the history and principles of Japanese gardening across the UK and Tatton Park. A talk packed full of information and one never to forget.

The Landscape Designs of Humphry Repton 1752-1818

Kate Harwood delivered the lecture, telling us that after several unsuccessful careers, including cloth merchant and playwright, Repton decided to become a landscape gardener in 1788, despite having no formal training.

This proved rather more successful with over 400 commissions in 30 years and Repton became famous for his red books, covered in Moroccan leather, with a flap system showing before and after design drawings. He became very skilful in opening up views across landscapes, reworking paths to show off these views and hiding views that were considered unsightly, such as kitchen gardens and ploughed fields.

Kate told us that Repton was not a horticulturalist and his drawings rarely showed details of plants used. His commissions included Tatton Park, Uppark House (W.Sussex), Cobham Hall and Woburn Abbey.

Kate's lecture provided a fascinating insight into Humphry Repton, the man, his life and his work, in this the bicentenary of his death.
